JOHN FINNEY AT GRAFTON

On February 13 at 7:30 p.m. at the Grafton-Upton Unitarian Church, John Finney will give a recital of harpsichord music by Bach Handel and Scarlatti. Mr. Finney graduated from the Oberlin College Conservatory of Music where he studied organ with David S. Boe and harpsichord with Lisa Goode Crawford. He continued his studies of historical instruments and early keyboard practices at the Academies in Bremen, W. Germany, and Pistoia, Italy. He recently received the Master of Music degree from the Boston Conservatory where he was a student of James David Christie. He has given many solo recitals throughout the United States and in Europe and has performed with the Boston Symphony Orchestra, Boston's Handel & Haydn Society, New York's Waverly Consort, and the Smithsonian Chamber Players of Washington, D.C. In 1982 he was a prizewinner at the International Organ Competition in Bruges, Belgium. He presently serves as Director of Music at the Wellesley Hills Congregational Church.

WORCESTER CHAPTER AGO TERCENTARY BACH PUZZLE

No doubt, you have already found enclosed in this newsletter a rather non-conventional looking puzzle. FIRST: You will need to complete the back side of the puzzle. Each lettered clue requires the name of a Bach work. There is no restriction as to the type of work. The greatest care has been taken in making sure that there is some distinguishing feature in certain clues where confusion might arise over works with essentially the same name, for it is the BWV number which is important. It is advisable to try to fill in all of the works' titles and then to go to a reference work and find the corresponding BWV numbers. You will notice that each pair of BWV numbers goes into a simple equation which yields another BWV number for a part of the Birthday Message (each part of which is marked by a Roman numeral.) When you have all of the BWV numbers for the parts of the Birthday Message, you will have to consult a reference work and find the titles for those BWV numbers. Obviously, the titles, when put into the Message, must be in English. They will fit nicely if properly translated.

NOTE: We have not consulted with anyone in preparing this puzzle. On the positive side, that means that no one is leaking the answers to anyone else. On the negative side, it means that we have no idea as to the difficulty or ease our readers will have with the puzzle. We hope that the clues require a little bit of thought and some cleverness without being so nasty as to be unfair. (The clues do function differently. In some cases, the work can only be arrived at through its nickname. It may be necessary to think German, or in other cases, the logic is purely English.)

NOTE: German scholars, do not get hung up on the fact that the titles in the message would have to be altered gramatically if actually kept in German when being transferred into different sentence structures. Bach scholars, do not get hung up on the fact that liberties have been taken in abandoning the original philosophical and theological meanings of the titles as they were originally meant by J. S. B.

CHARLES B. COHN
Art Collector, Teacher, and Patron of the Arts

It was a surprise to me when I heard of Charles Cohn's illness and death. Charles seemed to be as immutable as he was inscrutable, and we all will miss his strong presence in the Worcester musical and artistic community. Admittedly, he was eccentric, volatile, and demanding, but he was also generous and supportive. Perhaps the thing that I most appreciated about Charles, though, was his honesty about a fact most of us don't like to recognize: money is power, particularly in Worcester's cultural circles. His collections and bank accounts assured him of friends. He knew that and, in a way, I think, delighted in it and used the influence he gained to further the interests and causes he believed in. One of those interests was organ music. An organist until his disability prevented him from playing, he was a long-time member of the Guild and was seen at most organ recitals and Guild functions. I will miss not seeing him. He mastered many of the games I feel an amateur at and did it for the right reasons. Not a bad epitaph, after all...
