


A second concert in the Spring will feature David Tierney playing Sirota, Louise Mundinger playing Larsen, and Heinrich Christensen playing Decker.

WorcAGO Member Composers' Concert – Is there enough interest?

We have an exciting and unusual opportunity ahead of us: provide a program (at no cost to us for hall rental) as a part of the Mech Hall Hook's 150th Anniversary "Year of the Organ" (2014)

Several have expressed interest to participate (organ compositions are the focus, but choral/instrumental is fine as long as we have enough organ). Each composer would be limited to approx 10 minutes to allow for a balanced and interesting program.

However, we don't yet have a "critical mass" to be enough for a substantial highly publicized concert open to the public. The opportunity is amazing: perform your composition in one of New England's finest concert halls and be featured for general public exposure (and possibly online in a recording repository).

An Hour In the Life of an Organ Technician

[People often ask (and wonder) about organ tuning and sanctuary temperature, etc. Your Dean came across this informative snippet that you might find interesting]

Tuning a whole pipe organ is time consuming, especially with large organs. It's not a simple task like tuning every string in a piano. Since organs are wind instruments their pitch rises when air is less dense (warmer or more humid) and falls when more dense. If voicing is consistent within an organ, generally all flue pipes will rise and fall uniformly with changes in air density (and thus stay in tune with each other). Pitch differences between divisions are most always the result of temperature anomalies, usually from the heat not being on 24/7 and resulting cold drafts which result from the thermal mass of the building not being thoroughly warmed to a state where all the walls and chamber surfaces are in equilibrium.

Reeds will move differently from flues. Up to an extent, they will track the flue pipes if voiced on the dark side with resonators at their natural length and tongues curved with a relatively flat area near the tuning wire. Shorter resonators result in brighter more fiery tone as will tongues with a rounder curve beginning at the tuning wire, but tuning stability is decoupled. The pitch of such reeds may move considerably with small changes in temperature (thus out of tune from flues, and again depending on voicing inconsistencies, out of tune within the same rank).

Tuners generally go through the reeds to remove dirt which upsets both tone and pitch and then to correct tuning for the current air density (temperature, atmospheric pressure and humidity). Reeds are tuned to match the best average of the flues. Occasionally a flue pipe is found (usually with bad voicing) to be wildly out of tune. This "fault" is also fixed. Wood pipes have the added complication of expanding and contracting with changes in humidity. Loose stoppers aside, the pipes grow in internal volume when it is more humid during northeastern summer months and therefore go flat. This is the opposite of the pitch movement from otherwise less dense air. Likewise they shrink in dry weather, going sharp.

>> The Bloom residence is a Greek revival 1856 house with an *unaltered* interior with original gas light fixtures, marble mantles, period furniture, and authentic reproduction 19th century wallpapers. The house never really required restoration, just careful maintenance. The house might be one of the most important mid-nineteenth century houses in New England because of its state of preservation. Felix (Mendelssohn) the cat(lower right, above) is right at home! >>The "square grand" (parlor) piano is an Arlington of Boston and was built sometime shortly after the Civil War. It has a rosewood case and has never been restored: therefore, like the house it is in pretty much original, and enviable exquisite condition.
